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




Farm Operations & Production About

City Green's urban farms are the heart of the organization and consist of three separate food production farms: the City Green Farm Eco-Center in Clifton, City Green Farm at South Branch Preserve, and the Learning Garden in Eastside Park in Paterson. City Green grows over 90 varieties of vegetables and herbs that are not only culturally appropriate for the communities they serve, but healthy, local, and delicious as well. Each farm adheres to regenerative and organic growing practices to ensure healthy soil, healthy farm workers, and a healthy habitat for wildlife. Farming methods include crop rotation, cover cropping, natural pest management, hand weeding, and planting disease-resistant crop varieties.

The produce grown at City Green Farms is distributed to the local community through a network of farm stands, farmer's markets and location-specific deliveries via the "Veggie Mobile," with a goal of providing access to local farm-fresh food along with meaningful job and volunteer opportunities in an agricultural setting. But the importance of City Green's farms goes far beyond its bountiful harvests. Through interaction with the farm operation, individuals are able to create a connection to their food, understand the value and importance of open space, gain an appreciation for nature and local agriculture, and understand the potential of urban farming in revitalizing urban areas and improving public health in local communities. City Green Farms help ensure that farmland remains and important and productive part of the northern New Jersey landscape.





Regenerative practices

City Green is committed to growing healthy food in a way that benefits both people and planet. Sustainable farming is a method of producing food that meets the needs of the community without compromising the health of the land and soil for present and future generations.

Regenerative agriculture utilizes a variety of sustainable farming techniques which focus on increasing biodiversity, mitigating climate change, and strengthening the health and vitality of farm soil, among other important factors.

Here are just some of the regenerative practices that City Green Farms implemented in 2023:

No Till System in Clifton

The Farm-Eco Center in Clifton has fully transitioned to a no-till farm. No-till farming does not disturb the deeper layers of soil and the beneficial communities of insects and microorganisms that live there. This practice builds healthier soil, prevents erosion, and helps lower weed, pest and disease pressure on the farm!

Cover Cropping

At both City Green Farms, fields are rotated each year, meaning 2023's tomato beds might be 2024's zucchini beds! Instead of remaining empty, fields not in use are planted with cover crop for a season, maintaining healthy soil structure and allowing the field to regenerate valuable nutrients for next season's veggies

Rotational Grazing

Rotational grazing is the practice of moving animals through pasture to improve soil, plant, and animal health. City Green's chickens graze on the Permaculture Hill to help remove invasive weeds while eating pests and adding fertility to the land. The chickens also benefit from a healthy diet and livelihood!

The mission of the City Green Farm Stand and Mobile Market program is to connect with local governments and community organizations in northern NJ to increase the accessibility and affordability of local, farm-fresh food, ensuring good food is available for all. City Green's markets are enhanced by a nutrition incentive program that incentivizes federal food beneficiaries to purchase healthy food grown by City Green and other local farms. When shopping at City Green farm stands, customers gain an appreciation for local agriculture in their own community, support the local food movement, and foster personal connections to food, healthy eating and the environment.

Record Donations

When the market week is over and fresh produce is still available, City Green makes weekly donations to community partners in Clifton, Paterson and Passaic. In 2023, City Green made 40 individual donations to 6 community partners: Father English Community Center, Great Falls Military Assistance Pantry of Paterson, St. Peter's Haven, Mt. Pilgrim Missionary Baptist Church, The Food Justice Fridge, and Local Share. Donations added up to a record-breaking total of 8,759 pounds of produce, compared to 7,915 in 2022.

Adapting New Technology to Serve FMNP Customers

In 2023, the state of New Jersey moved its WIC and Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program benefits online. Instead of paper vouchers, FMNP benefits are now built into digital QR codes which require an internet connection to be redeemed at markets. By incorporating an iPad-based POS system equipped with a 5G data plan, City Green was able to serve 2,914 customers with FMNP. Due to these new technological barriers, we were one of only 4 farm stands in Passaic County to accept these benefits in 2023.

WIC Office Box Markets

In partnership with the Passaic WIC Office, City Green held 2 special markets exclusive to WIC clients, providing 160 families with a discounted box of freshly harvested vegetables from City Green farms. Through these markets, the program seeks to provide better fresh food access to families with WIC in Passaic, where Veggie Mobile sees the highest volume of WIC FMNP redemptions.

Focus On Seniors

In 2023, City Green's markets experienced a 126% increase in customers with SFMNP. Between 5 senior Veggie Mobile Sites, Total Senior Nutrition Center, Evergreen Manor and Senior Housing of Hazel St. in Clifton, and Senior Towers and Freedom Village in Paterson, 1,246 seniors were ale to double their federal nutrition benefirts when purchasing farm fresh produce from City Green. This amounted to a record-breaking \$15,797 in SFMNP sales.



Community Supported Agriculture

CSA stands for *Community Supported Agriculture*. It is a partnership between farmers and consumers, where consumers purchase a share of a farm's products in advance. Members typically pay in full in the off-season, providing the income farms need to prepare for the spring. CSA programs directly connect consumers and producers to help create a more participatory and transparent local food system.

City Green started its CSA program in 2020, when the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic called for a safe, low-contact alternative to the crowded market environment. Since then, the program has experienced considerable success, opening new doorways for City Green to build long-lasting relationships with community members and foster education about nutrition and local agriculture.

Highlights

In 2023, the City Green CSA Program hosted 75 members at the Farm/Eco Center to pick up weekly shares of healthy, organic produce grown on City Green's Clifton and Mt. Olive farms. Each week was an opportunity for neighbors to meet, share stories and recipes, and get more involved in City Green's mission. The CSA program runs for 23 weeks from June-November, and 8 weeks from December- January, allowing members to experience the joy of eating with every season!









Good Food Bucks

City Green's Good Food Bucks program is New Jersey's only statewide SNAP Nutrition Incentive Program. City Green provides funding, training, and technical assistance to farmers markets, farm stands, mobile markets, CSA's, and grocery stores so that SNAP customers can double the amount of fresh fruits and vegetables on their tables, while at the same time supporting the farmers who grow their food. Customers receive Good Food Buck fruit and vegetable coupons, or a 50% Good Food Bucks discount every time they use their SNAP card, to buy fresh produce at a participating market. Since 2011, the Good Food Bucks program has had a powerful impact on NJ residents by making healthy, local food affordable and accessible.



The mission of the Good Food Bucks Program is to support New Jersey fresh produce retailers in their efforts to increase affordability of Jersey-fresh produce for low-income families at their markets, while also creating greater economic opportunities for farmers and local businesses.

City Green provides funding, training and technical assistance to participating retailers to run a Nutrition Incentive Program that incentivizes families to spend their federal food benefit dollars at their local participating farmers' market or grocery store.

Good Food Bucks Impact



USDA GusNIP

In September 2021, City Green received a USDA GusNIP (Gus Schumacher Nutrition Incentive Program) grant to expand and evolve the Good Food Bucks program to more locations and more NJ counties. With this \$500,000 award, we raised an additional \$500,000 in matching funds from local foundations. As the only statewide SNAP nutrition incentive program for NJ farmers markets and grocery stores, Good Food Bucks is now on its way to being available at 40 different locations spanning 14 counties statewide.

Supermarket Expansion

With GusNIP funding, City Green has been able to bring the Good Food Bucks program not only to farms and farmers markets, but also to brick-and-mortar grocery stores. This program expansion means Good Food Bucks can reach more NJ residents in more locations on more days of the week. In 2023, Good Food Bucks can be found at the ShopRite of Newark, Dry Goods Refillery, and the ShopRite of East Orange, with more stores coming soon!

USDA FMPP

With support from a three-year USDA Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP) grant, City Green launched its "Farmers for Food Access" Resource Hub to help connect more NJ farmers and farmers markets with nutrition assistance programs like SNAP, WIC, FMNP, and Good Food Bucks. New resources include webinars, SNAP and WIC authorization workbooks, and dedicated technical assistance. FMPP funding also supports statewide marketing for the Good Food Bucks program at farms and farmers markets, and provides professionally designed videos, banners, flyers, sandwich boards, digital ads, so that Good Food Bucks can become a household name in New Jersey!

Good Food Bucks Across New Jersey

In 2023 Good Food Bucks are offered at 30 farms & markets and 3 brick-and-mortar partners across 14 NJ counties. In total, over 18,000 people use Good Food Bucks every year, and 92 local and regional farmers earn additional revenue from Good Food Buck purchases

The mission of the Engagement & Advocacy Department is to foster broad support and interaction with City Green's programs and mission through community events, building new relationships, strengthening partnerships, and disseminating information. Community Engagement works to connect the entire City Green team and body of activity with the people it hopes to serve. Good Food Bucks in the White House

City Green's Advocacy team has built strong connections with the offices of local and federal legislators like State Senator Teresa Ruiz and Senator Cory Booker. As a result, City Green has provided written and spoken testimonial about the importance and impact of SNAP nutrition incentives at both state and federal level listening sessions with the aim of influencing the 2023 Farm Bill and establishing state legislation for continued funding of nutrition incentives.

City Green celebrated Paterson gardeners and honored its garden contest winner at this event in Eastside Park, where neighborhood gardeners gathered, supported each other and shared their home gardening stories.

Legislative Priorities

Secure State Investment into SNAP Nutrition Incentives

Through years of advocating with state and federal legislators, City Green was able to successfully pave the way for New Jersey to fund, for the first time, SNAP Nutrition Incentives.

Additionally, our advocacy efforts have resulted in the introduction of legislation to establish a State of New Jersey Fruit and Vegetable Incentive Program. Bills have been introduced in both the New Jersey State Senate and State Assembly. Lawmakers on both sides of the aisle are in support of nutrition incentives for New Jersey.

City Green successfully advocated for funding in the state budget for Good Food Bucks. A coalition of state Senators and Assemblypersons supported the budget appropriations of \$500,000 - New Jersey's first ever state award to SNAP incentives.

Other priorities include:

- Municipal and county-level policies to support increased fresh food access and affordability
- Municipal and county-level policies to promote and sustain farmers markets and farm stands
- State policies and legislation to support land availability and funding for urban agriculture and growers






Volunteers

City Green offers volunteer and internship opportunities for members of the community to further our mission of enhancing and maintaining preserved open spaces, producing local, healthy food, educating both adults and children, and taking an active role in environmental stewardship. City Green offers a variety of volunteer and internship opportunities so that members of the community can participate in ways that fit their interests and schedule. The Wednesday Volunteer Program offers a way for individuals and small groups to lend a hand to the Community Horticulture and Agriculture Teams at City Green in a fun and productive way.

City Green's weekly "Wednesday Weeders" volunteer program hosted over 214 people for over 581 hours in our farms and gardens. Volunteers helped harvest food for City Green's Veggie Mobile and Farm Stand program and maintained the farm's native plant gardens and landscaping. 89 people from 7 different Corporate Volunteer Groups completed and sponsored full-day projects at City Green's Farm Eco-Center, contributing financial support and labor to City Green, while participating in a day of team building out in nature.



Dig In!

The mission of the Dig In! program is to support the creation of vibrant gardens in urban, suburban and rural areas of Passaic County for the production of healthy food, habitat restoration, neighborhood beautification and community enhancement. Through participation in Dig In! community members gain access to financial support, educational workshops, technical assistance and materials and resources for the successful establishment of sustainable garden projects and access to City Green's Tool Lending Library.

In 2023, the Dig In! program awarded 9 different grants to support community gardens and neighborhood farms, tree and habitat restoration gardens, and water supplies for existing gardens in Passaic County.

City Sprouts

The mission of City Sprouts is to create safe, beautiful vegetable and flower gardens for children in urban communities, enhanced by an outdoor education program that ensures interaction with the natural world, access to hands-on experiential learning, and an understanding of where food comes from. Children are further engaged through community partnership and family participation. Through participation in City Sprouts, children develop an appreciation for the natural environment and for the taste and health benefits of freshly picked veggies.

The City Sprouts program takes place in three seasonal sessions: Spring, Summer, and Fall. This year 580 children had unique outdoor learning experiences at 7 different City Sprouts Gardens. The curriculum was taught through 106 different weekly lesson sessions covering 20 different topics, each lasting 30-45 minutes. These outdoor lessons not only introduce children to new knowledge, skills, and vocabulary, but also give them an opportunity to channel their after-school energy into the sensory experience of the garden. Through City Sprouts, students are able to make meaningful connections between food and nature that will last a lifetime!

School Grounds

School Grounds provides outdoor garden classrooms, teacher training, and ongoing support for partner schools in NJ, with a focus on at-risk urban communities, while also enhancing academic achievement across disciplines, and ensuring student interactions with the natural world, access to hands-on experiential learning, and an understanding of where food comes from. Collaborating teachers gain curriculum, resources, knowledge, and enthusiasm to use this outdoor educational classroom as a tool for cultivating a farm to school culture that values and celebrates garden education as an integral part of developing the whole child.

Highlights: In 2023, City Green added 13 school gardens to the School Grounds network which as of 2023 consists of 108 different schools. School Grounds supports outdoor learning gardens in 36 different municipalities. 243 New Jersey teachers were trained in gardening techniques and specialized garden curriculum this year alone.

Growing Strong

Growing Strong provides paid summer employment to high school students from at-risk communities in Paterson and Clifton, enhanced by a youth development program that ensures college and career readiness. By working in an urban farming and market enterprise or educational garden camp program, interns positively engage with their community, benefit from purposeful mentorship and peer collaboration, and foster a personal connection with food systems, healthy eating, and the environment.

Since its inception in 2008, Growing Strong has grown in capacity from 3 students to 17, with a competitive application process. Often, former Growing Strong interns will return to City Green for future employment opportunities, allowing them to continue building their skill sets over years and providing City Green with a resource pool of more trained and knowledgeable staff.

Highlights

In 2023, the Growing Strong program provided 14 high-schoolers with paid summer employment. Over the course of the 8- week program, interns worked in one of three groups. Farm Crew harvested thousands of pounds of food from the Clifton Farm Eco-Center, Market Crew sold fresh produce to their communities, and Farm and Garden Camp educators taught enriching outdoor curriculum to farm and garden campers in Clifton and Paterson. Built into the Growing Strong program are weekly Food Justice and professional workshops led by City Green staff which seek to contextualize the work Growing Strong does at City Green and prepare them for entering the professional world after high school. Through these workshops, students are able to feel empowered about the work that they do and inspired to keep seeking positive change in the world around them!

In Their Own Words

"With all of the stigmas that come with growing up in a low-income and underfunded community -"ghetto" is one of them. City Green shows that no matter how much people try to take the last pieces of green left in the "ghettos" (that they purposely fill with fast food restaurants, unfinished projects, and other plans that harm our youth and earth) ghettos still get green. Showing the youth growing up in Paterson that there's another way, that the roots hold the real nutrients that will nourish their mind, bodies and souls- is a form of rebellion to those who took away those resources in the first place." - Adapted from City Green's Youth Climate Action Capstone Project, the Climate Action Collective is a 3-month long group learning opportunity that deepens students understanding of climate change and empowers them to take action against it in their communities.
- In weekly meetings, volunteer sessions on the farm and in the gardens, and field trips, students from Clifton High School, Paterson STEAM High School, Hackensack High School, and the Passaic County Technical-Vocational Schools learned foundational knowledge about the climate crisis, discussed material from climate justice leaders, completed hands-on activities about art and ecology, and developed their personal leadership styles. Guided by City Green's School and Community Garden Coordinator Miranda Madrazo, the students followed a series of 8 climate change themes.
- Participants independently researched and wrote educational toolkits on each of the themes covered by the program. To culminate the program, participants hosted a Climate Gallery Walk for family, friends, and other invited community members to attend and learn more about climate change, featuring their toolkits on display.
